#### **MISSION STATEMENT**

With perseverance and a commitment to learn and grow, the Gorman Fort Banks School staff, students, and families will work together to make a positive contribution to the school and community. Our core values include: celebrating the diversity and uniqueness among us, fostering respect for one another and our school, encouraging a curiosity for learning that will allow each member to maximize his or her own potential, and cultivating independent life-long learners.

#### BACKGROUND OF COUNCIL AND ITS OPERATIONS

The Gorman Fort Banks Elementary School Council was formed in accordance with Massachusetts General Law, Section 59C of the Education Reform Act of 1993, which states that:

At each public elementary, secondary and independent vocational school in the commonwealth there shall be a school council consisting of the school principal, who shall co-chair the council; parents of students attending such school, who will be chosen in elections held by the recognized parent-teacher organization under the direction of the principal. Teachers who shall be selected by the teachers in the school, other persons, not parents or teachers of students in the school.

The school council shall meet regularly with the principal of the school and assist in adopting educational goals for the school that are consistent with local educational policies and statewide student performance standards, the identification of the educational needs of the students attending the school, review of the annual school building budget, and in the formulation of a school improvement plan.

The Site Council met on a regular pre-determined monthly schedule. In the spirit of communication and with the intention of keeping our school community informed, our school's website has a designated link to our School Site Council. The link includes all agendas and meeting minutes.

- a scheduled plan for reducing class size if deemed necessary
- professional development for the school's staff and the allocation of any professional development funds in the school budget

- school safety and discipline
- establishment of a school environment characterized by tolerance and respect for all groups
- extra curricular activities
- means for meeting, with the regular education programs at the school, the diverse learning needs of
  as many children as possible, including children with special needs currently assigned to separate
  programs
- any further subjects the principal, in consultation with the school council shall consider appropriate

### SUMMARY/STATUS OF 2017-2018 GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

There were a variety of changes and initiatives that characterized the 2017-2018 academic year, not the least of which was the district's lengthening of the school day for both students and staff. The most notable change for staff in our school was the addition of common planning time. Additional minutes to the school day provided an opportunity for teachers to plan and collaborate with colleagues both vertically and horizontally. Students gained an additional five minutes on their specials (art, music, computers, physical education, academic support/science) and an additional fifteen minutes in overall academic content.

This past summer a small group of dedicated Winthrop teachers and administrators analyzed the Commonwealth's new standards and generated a curriculum map that detailed the scope and sequence of science, math and language arts content and instruction. The process helped align the approaches among all schools and provided quite a bit of clarity to our teachers as to where improvements and revisions need to occur. For the past several years, Gorman Fort Banks School teachers have selected grade level goals that they collectively embrace with a vision of improving learning experiences and academic progress for our students. This year a large majority of student learning and professional practice goals focused on science and math.

Data analysis both within our school and at the elementary level reveals very modest gains in math. A commitment to examining the methodology of teaching and assessing math has been bolstered by intensive professional development. Last year's professional development efforts focused on developing new instructional approaches to engaging students in math. Changes to instruction are taking hold in our classrooms as the academic language and depth of thinking demonstrated by our students gradually improves. This year's focus is on assessing the growth and knowledge of our students. Although there are a large variety of commercial assessments for English Language Arts and Reading at the early elementary level, there are a surprisingly low number of options in math. Many of our teachers have established a professional practice goal around revising and creating chapter assessments that more accurately measure student learning. With this data, they can define the specifics of student learning goals to ensure students are being taken to their maximum threshold of learning.

It is unfortunate but not uncommon that many lower elementary students are not afforded an articulated science curriculum. Frankly there are so many foundational skills that must be mastered in the early grades that forced sacrifices in content coverage is a reality. After a closer look at the new next generation science standards and with the realization that standardized testing will extend to science at the elementary level, limited instruction is no longer a choice. The administrative response to this call to action was dedicating our academic support model exclusively to science using a project-based science curriculum. Teachers agreed with this important adjustment and have selected both professional practice and student learning goals around creating our project-based science curriculum. Their work, which is characterized by collegial

practice and candid dialogue, will ultimately give them the curriculum, instructional guidance and assessment tools they need to provide students with three weekly blocks of learning exclusively focused on science.

Our work on developing an approach to social emotional learning continues as we expand the scope of our S.M.A.R.T. Plan (acronym for Say Kind Words, Make Safe Choices, Always Be Responsible, Respect Your School, Try Your Best). This year students enjoyed monthly assemblies that highlighted target behaviors and acknowledged S.M.A.R.T. students. To help us recognize the impact of our efforts, the discipline referral process has been revised to align with our SMART Plan. In the spring we launched a data collection program to help us assess the Plan's effectiveness in reducing undesirable behaviors and discipline issues. As a school we are working to groom a collective mentality towards being a SMART Student with the hopes that it is reflected in our school's culture and values. Classrooms have established behavior and/or academic goals for which they earn special recognition and/or rewards. The next phase of this Plan will focus on our approach to helping students appreciate how each component of the SMART Plan is relevant to positively influencing the personal work habits and approach students apply in their academic pursuits.

Technology improvements have resulted in improved wi-fi and more reliable connectivity. Equipment for both teacher instruction and student learning however is becoming antiquated and in need of repair and replacement. Fiscal limitations of the district, limited personnel and the needs of other schools have made it difficult for Gorman Fort Banks staff and students to rely on technology as a predictable teaching and learning enhancement. We recognize the challenges the school department faces in meeting the technology requests in the district and remain optimistic that our needs will be considered and satisfied in the next school year.

We acknowledge with gratitude the support of the school's Parent Teacher Organization, Superintendent, School Committee and Town officials. The status of this year's goals is summarized below.
