There aren't too many events that are celebrated exclusively at school which makes Read Across America Week unique. Read Across America is intended to celebrate and coincide with Dr. Seuss' birthday. Dr. Seuss has authored more than 60 entertaining children's books many of which have become a staple in introducing students to phonemic awareness and subsequent reading skills.

We will celebrate Read Across America week March 9-13 by students wearing clothing associated with some of Dr. Seuss's more famous works. Please be sure to check the March calendar for details so your child can be an active part of this staff and student celebration.

From my perspective, this celebration has tremendous value for our students and their families. Students are motivated to read when opportunities to actively engage with text are provided. Students' enjoyment of reading is always enhanced when they are part of making a book come alive. This encourages students to personalize their learning and make meaning of both content and the impact of print.

The value of Read Across America week isn't lost on parents. Opportunities to point out letter-sound relationships, expand vocabulary and encourage acute listening skills are all embedded in adult-assisted reading. And reading promotes imagination and conversation that can be anchored to common experiences. What parent doesn't want that to be made easy?

The reality is that reading is at the core of all we do so it must be considered a high impact skill. This high impact skill is not one we are born with the capacity to develop naturally (like walking for example). It must be explicitly taught in multiple ways and with focused intention. There are far too many benefits to reading to list but here's a few to motivate YOU to partner with us to support your child's reading development:

- Reading exercises our brain.
- Reading improves concentration.
- Reading improves vocabulary and language skills.

And to motivate your child to develop an interest in reading try these tips:

- Choose books about topics, subjects or themes your child loves.
- Read both fiction and non-fiction.
- Read together and for a purpose (think recipes, grocery lists, directions).
- Read with enthusiasm and interest.

And most importantly, make time for shared reading every day even once your child begins to read independently. After all, making time for reading speaks to our values in a big way.
